Unit 1—Timed-essay Exam: Assignment Sheet & Calendar

Your purpose in this unit is to learn some valuable strategies that will help you prepare for and succeed in a timed-essay exam (strategies for critical reading, note taking, decoding essay prompts, etc.). Like exams you may take in other courses at Purdue, this exam tests you on a body of knowledge. Throughout this mission you will critically read articles that attempt to define literacy and address what literacy means in the context of higher education. Also, these readings address how the literacy practices of higher education mean very different things for folks from different racial, cultural, and economic backgrounds. The timed-essay exam will ask you to explore, illustrate, interrogate, and explain the content of these readings.

Through completing this mission you will show that you are able to:

- answer an essay exam question, indicating your ability to follow directions and manage your time effectively.
- structure an argument in a format that reveals your relationship to, familiarity with, and opinions of the articles mentioned previously.
- demonstrate that you can present a coherent argument in a systematic way.
- compose an essay where mechanical and grammatical errors do not impede a reader's ability to understand your argument.

You will be able to choose one of three sample prompts. You will have 30 minutes to plan, write, and edit your essay.

We will conduct a practice exam on Friday, September 2nd. The practice exam will utilize the same structure as the final exam. **We will conduct the final exam for the unit on Wednesday, September** 7th.

In total, Unit 1 is worth 15% of your final grade for the course. This includes the *Key Verbs* quiz, discussion leader/study guide assignment, practice exam, and final exam.
